NEWS AND NOTICES

Minibus Stolen

Just after our August newsletter went to print we had one of our minibuses stolen by joyriders. The bus was quickly recovered by the police but unfortunately the joyriders had crashed the bus into a lamppost causing extensive damage which resulted in our insurance company writing it off. Accordingly we have had to order a new minibus which is a very significant cost with a new one costing almost £40,000 and of course the insurance for the old one was nowhere near that so we are now busy fundraising to fund the shortfall of £30,000.

World Sight Day

This was on Thursday 13th October and is a day when we try to raise the public's awareness of avoidable sight loss.

The risk of getting various sight conditions later in life can be reduced by simple lifestyle changes such as good diet, not smoking, regular exercise, protecting your eyes from the sun and regular eye tests.

On World Sight Day we handed out Eye Health leaflets to people as they walked past our Mappin Street Centre and also invited them in for a free eye check which was a service offered by Martin Kemp Opticians. Many hundreds of leaflets were handed out and about 40 people took advantage of the free eye check.

COMMUNITY ADVICE OFFICER NEWS

Employment Issues

We are aware that some clients have experienced difficulties with their employers. In the current economic climate many employers have been trying to reduce staffing. This has involved redeployment, changes of roles, and changes of conditions for many people.

People with disabilities including visual impairment may find they are under particular pressure, or find the difficulties especially difficult to deal with. Employers do have duties under the Disability Discrimination Act to make special provision to enable people to work.

If you are experiencing difficulties at work relating to anything like this, you can sometimes get help from a trades union or from the local occupational health services. If you want any advice relating to this or similar issues please contact our Community Advice Officers.



Employment Support Allowance (ESA)

There are also many changes being made to the way ESA and other benefits are assessed.

If you are contacted about benefits and need advice or help completing forms then please contact us as quickly as possible so that we can give you the most up to date advice.

Self Directed Support

Sheffield City Council is in the process of implementing Self Directed Support which will provide anybody who requires care services with a sum of money which they can use to purchase the care. This will replace the current system where Social Services organise the care package for people.

If you are contacted by the council about this and require any assistance please do not hesitate to contact **SRSB** and one of our Community Advice Officers will be pleased to assist you.

The main group for 8 to 16 year olds meets every Sunday at Westfield School Sports Centre between 10am and 1pm. There is now a group for 4 to 8 year olds which meets on the last Sunday of each month.

SRSB staff are actively involved with Sheffield Actionnaires linking in some

of our Activity Days with their parents' meetings.

Visually Impaired Cricket

Garbett Leads Yorkshire VICC to Twenty20 Cup Glory

John Garbett scored a blistering 74 to help steer Yorkshire to a thumping 105 run victory over the Welsh Dragons to secure the Twenty20 Cup at Leamington Cricket Club.

It wasn't all plain sailing though as the Yorkshire innings got off to a less than ideal start losing the dynamic duo of Mark Betts and Peter Blueitt fairly cheaply. Although in came master blaster, Tafazal Naqvi of Sheffield who soon accelerated the Yorkshire innings, scoring a quick fire 39 before being caught out in the covers. Having built up some momentum, it was now left to Elliott Conway and man of the moment John Garbett to build a partnership, and it didn't take either batsman long to get into their stride with both beginning to score quite freely thanks to some less than average bowling.

With the runs starting to flow Yorkshire targeted the bowling of the Dragons' B1's, who between them conceded in excess of 100 runs off their 6 overs. This really put the Welsh side on the back foot and thanks to some late big hitting from Elliott and John, Yorkshire amassed a daunting 207 off their 20 overs.

The Dragons innings started poorly, losing one of their openers inside the second over with not many runs on the board. The Yorkshire bowlers had started brightly and unlike the Dragons were much more disciplined, bowling good lines and lengths and in doing so kept the extras to a minimum. They were also ably supported in the field with Tafazal Naqvi taking some stunning catches out in the deep.

Wickets soon began to fall at regular intervals which seriously halted the Dragons progress. Special praise must go to Alex Towers who was most miserly, only giving away a handful of runs off his allotted overs. His efforts contributed massively in putting the squeeze on the Dragons innings leading their batsmen to panic. However once again it was John Garbett who stole the show, ripping through the Dragons middle order finishing with 3 wickets. It all meant that Yorkshire VICC had won the match by a whopping 105 runs as the Dragons innings ended on a modest 102 for 7.
