#### **Bus Pass Renewal**

Many mobility and senior citizen bus passes are now coming up for renewal.

People who are registered partially sighted or blind can contact us to arrange renewals in the South Yorkshire area. We can also arrange for senior citizen passes to be changed to mobility special passes. We must have the person's details and have seen their CVI (certificate of visual impairment).

People who are not registered visually impaired who have a mobility bus pass will need to contact Social Services at Howden House to obtain confirmation that they are entitled to a mobility pass. For more information you can call them on 0114 273 4897.

Senior citizen passes can be renewed at the Travel Information Centres.

You will need proof of identity and proof of your address.

Note: Once a new pass is issued the previous one is void.

#### **Bus Ticket Machines**

First are introducing a new ticket machine on their buses with effect from 6th February so by the time you read this you may have already encountered one. We understand that anyone who is registered partially sighted or blind and has a mobility special pass will not be required to swipe the bus pass on the ticket machine and will not receive a ticket.

Stagecoach are also introducing a similar ticket machine and we are assured the same applies

If you are asked to swipe your card or take a ticket please calmly ask the driver for assistance, explaining that you have a sight problem. In this case please keep the ticket and try to get it to us so that we can pursue the issue.

If anybody has any feedback on the new ticket machine then please contact us at **SRSB** and we will pass the information on to First, Stagecoach and South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive (SYPTE).

# **Telephone Scams**

We have some reports from clients of telephone scams so please be careful if you are telephoned by somebody you are not expecting a call from. If you are asked to give your name, address, post code, date of birth or bank details be extremely suspicious and just put the phone down as any genuine caller should already know who they are calling. The latest scams reported to us are as follows: -

You are called by somebody (usually with a foreign accent) saying that you are due a refund from the government or your bank but they then want to know your name, address, date of birth and bank details. Just put the phone down.

The other scam says they are calling about internet security and they have noticed that you have viruses etc on your computer. They can sort the problem out for you but need to access your computer remotely. Again put the phone down.

In both cases when you put the phone down they may call you back and sound very convincing, being offended that you have put the phone down on them. Please do not be taken in and put the phone down again. If you do give them your bank details or access to your computer it is very likely that you will find money being removed from your bank account so please be very careful.

It is possible to trace malicious calls by dialling 1477 after you have put the phone down. Any information you get from this you should pass on to the police and/or trading standards.

Note: The 1477 service is available if your telephone service is with BT or with TalkTalk (it may be possible with some other providers but you would need to check with them).

# **Council Tax - Possible Reduction**

Just a mention about something that can easily be overlooked in relation to Council Tax if there is a carer in a household.

If the carer: -

- provides care for at least 35 hours a week on average,
- is resident in the same dwelling as the person cared for,
- is not the parent of the person cared for (if the child is under 18) and is not the partner of the person cared for,

and cares for a person who is entitled to one of the following:

 the highest rate Disability Living Allowance care component,

- the higher rate of Attendance Allowance
- or constant attendance allowance, then the carer will be disregarded when calculating Council Tax Liability.

As Council Tax is calculated based upon two adults sharing a property, there is potential to have a 25% or even a 50% reduction in a bill.

Please contact **SRSB** if you would like to discuss the above further, even if there are more than two people in the household, as it can be a little complex and people may be missing out on a reduction!

# Listening to the City

A university design student Linda Grasso has been studying the way in which visually impaired people perceive the world. She writes ....

Jean Paul Sartre, the French writer says, "The body is what I immediately am... I am body."

We use our bodies to navigate through the city. Sight, hearing, taste, smell and touch are our senses, which we use to perceive the city. Usually there is a ranking of sight above sound, the eve above the ear and also above all of the other senses, which the sociologist Anthony Synnott has called 'ocularcentrism'.

We live in a very visually orientated society. The sense of sight is very powerful, strict and heavy. Sometimes it overpowers all of our other senses. It is the sense in which we trust, as Aristotle wrote in the first sentence of his Metaphysics: "Of all the senses, trust only the sense of sight."

But is this really true? As an urban designer I keep on asking myself, is the predominance of visuality the right way of analysing and talking about cities and their networks? For a sound project at the University of Sheffield I met Julie and Jane, two volunteers from the Sheffield Royal Society for the Blind, who helped me to listen to the city in a very detailed way. I came to the conclusion that every city and every environment has got specific sounds, and therefore its own identity distinct from its outward appearance.

The following is a description of my visit to the Devonshire Cat pub based

on the sounds I heard: As soon as I open the door and start walking through the pub, there are different levels of sounds from the people inside. Various groups of voices surround me like individual sound bubbles. By the echo-effect from the noise of the crowd you can sense that this is a large pub. I am approaching the bar. The clink of cash and sound of a drink being poured is getting louder. A lot of people are talking to each other around me. While I am ordering my drink the lady at the bar is creating a tapping sound with her shoes on the pavement. I can hear the noise of fridge doors being opened and closed, while bottles are clanging. Again the clink of cash. I am taking a seat next to the window. It is echoing the sounds from the pub towards me. Laughing, talking and shouting surrounds me. It is getting busier.

When I asked Julie what makes the sound of Sheffield different to any other city, she said: "I can only think of one sound that distinguishes Sheffield from other cities and that is the rumbling of the Supertram, as trams in other cities don't sound like that - not the Manchester Metro, or the trams in Berlin or Amsterdam or other European cities that I can remember. Sheffield ones are definitely a bit different. You can hear them from inside the cathedral or in our Church on Infirmary road, and although they aren't particularly noisy or rattley they make quite a smooth sound they are very distinctive.

I already had a few computer skills, so I finished the ten week introductory course early and Jayne provided me with other interesting things to do. I am looking forward to January when we all meet again.

So I would urge any one who is wanting to learn new skills or even begin to use a computer with a mild visual impairment to to book a place on the next course that is due to start after Easter.
