QUEEN'S DIAMOND JUBILEE

OLYMPIC GAMES

During June the Olympic Torch Relay came through South Yorkshire and **SRSB** was represented by two torch bearers. First, Julie Smethurst, one of our trustees, carried the torch through Parson Cross on 25th June and the following day Simon Wheatcroft, a client and supporter from Doncaster as well as an ultra-runner, carried the torch through Armthorpe in Doncaster.

In the first week of the Olympics we held our own Olympic events in our Activity Centre. We were grateful to receive funding from Sheffield and District Association for the Disabled to purchase a curling set so we held a curling and skittles tournament each day (OK, we know that curling is really part of the winter Olympics and perhaps skittles is not an official event but never mind). We held an official prize giving with gold, silver and bronze medals presented whilst we stood to sing The National Anthem. Everyone had a great time and we have been asked if we can have a monthly sports day.

Julie Smethurst also joined us each day bringing her Olympic Torch and

speaking about her experience of carrying it. Here is her own account of the week.

SRSB – Going For Gold

While Team GB was racking up the medals **SRSB** celebrated the first week of London 2012 with its own Olympic events.

As part of these, each day I brought my Olympic torch into the Activity Centre so that clients could have a close look at it and have their photographs taken with it if they wished.

I had the enormous honour of carrying the Olympic flame in Parson Cross on 25th June when the Olympic Torch Relay visited Sheffield. The selection process took almost a year as, following a random electronic ballot last August, the regional judging panels whittled down 28,000 nominations to arrive at the final figure of 8,000 torchbearers. Most of us were nominated for the contribution we have made in our local community. I was nominated by one of my Sheffield Philharmonic Chorus colleagues for the work I have done around cultural matters and disabled access in Sheffield, part of which is being a Trustee of SRSB. Several staff, volunteers and clients turned out on the day to support me, and Rt Hon David Blunkett, MP was there to greet me before my leg of the relay. The Chorus sang "You'll never walk alone" as I went by and the roadsides were packed with cheering crowds. It was truly a never-to-be-forgotten few moments.

Since then I've been invited into eight schools to talk about the Relay and give the pupils a chance for photographs with the torch. I've also attended lots of other community events and SRSB's Olympic celebrations were the culmination of them. The whole wonderful experience has been unique, joyful and unforgettable; it has been the most terrific fun and pleasure, as well as the greatest honour, to represent my community and city in this very Julie Smethurst special way.

TacMap™

TacMap™, making spaces accessible to visually impaired people.

Patricia, Director of the Sheffield company TacMap is leading our second workshop session at the SRSB on Thursday 23rd August from 2pm to 4pm.

"The first session on the 13th July was very beneficial for the participants. We gave them instructions on how to use the TacMap system which has been designed to enable you to find your way around indoor spaces. Our tactile plans will help you to 'see' how a building is laid out before your visit by showing you where to find strategic points such as entrances, exits, fire exits, receptions, toilets, lifts, stairs, evacuation points, dining areas, cash machines, and specific rooms.

"We recently exhibited at Sight Village in Birmingham where we got lots of interest. We hope our system will be shortly available in many indoor spaces. If you would like to learn how to use this useful and simple tool to give you more confidence, independence, dignity and safety in your everyday life, then join us on 23rd August.

Which Bus is That?

Do you use the bus to travel around Sheffield/South Yorkshire or if not. would you like to be able to do so? SRSB is working with South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive (SYPTE) to try to ensure that bus transport across South Yorkshire is as accessible as possible for blind and partially sighted people. One area that we are currently investigating is how people can identify the bus they are getting on. We would like to know if you are able to read the number on the front of the bus and if so whether this applies to all buses or just some buses. If only some buses, is there one type of sign that is better than others? If so please let us know.

Also, did you know that if you have a mobility VI special bus pass you can hold out the orange wallet that is provided with the pass whilst you are stood at any bus stop and bus drivers should stop and tell you where the bus

is going. This is part of the training that bus drivers receive so please do not be embarrassed if it is not the bus you require.

If there are any other issues that you would like to raise relating to the accessibility of bus, tram or train travel in South Yorkshire then please let us know so that we can try to find a solution.

24th to 30th June saw 18 clients and friends descend on Llandudno!

The coach taking us was late arriving at Mappin Street from Scotland, but we were in holiday mood and spent the wait getting to know new friends and catching up with old ones. We ate our lunch and Olwen kept us supplied with hot drinks. We had only one stop on the journey and arrived at the Belmont Hotel to be greeted with dinner. The evening entertainer had a depleted audience as people unpacked and rested after the journey.

There was entertainment in the hotel each evening and there was also plenty to do in the locality. At the bandstand on the prom there was a brass band concert on Monday evening; on Tuesday a choice of two Male Voice Choirs: another on Thursday, and on Wednesday "Showtime." Café VIPs - Service with a Smile

Hearing Aids

The Equipment Centre now stocks and can replace NHS hearing aid batteries and tubing. These can only be issued to people who bring their 'brown books' issued to them by the hospital audiology clinic when they first got their hearing aids. This is to help us and the hospital keep track of stock and monitors the efficiency of the hearing aids. If you have lost your 'brown book,' new ones can be obtained from the hearing aid department at the hospital. Unfortunately we cannot change tubing in privately bought hearing aids, though we can still sell batteries for a small charge.

Equipment Centre

We continue to add new products to the Equipment Centre. The range of products is too large to list here in full so for further information please telephone us or call in any weekday between 8:30am and 4:30pm.

A few of the things that we think you might like to know about are: -

Amazon Kindle

In the Equipment Centre we have an Amazon Kindle to demonstrate to anyone who is interested. It is a small portable device which can store hundreds of books. It is capable of changing the text size and has built in voice for books which allow this (don't even get me started on DRM!!!). One of the major selling points of the Kindle is the e-ink screen, which makes it look much more like a real page! It has no backlighting so doesn't cause the same lighting problems associated with a computer screen or tablet. Do pop in for a look.

Walking Stick Clinger

Ever got fed up with picking that walking stick up off the floor? Or searching around for a suitable place to lean it against???? Well we have a simple solution. For £4 you can purchase a walking stick holder that clips around your stick and grips to a surface. Call in to the Equipment Centre for a demonstration and check whether it fits your stick.

Pen Friend

This is a simple labelling device that enables you to record your own audio label for almost anything including your clothes. Then it was time to meet again at the last covered spot, with lots of members with bags of loot. Believe you not it was still raining hard so my hair got another dousing. Still we were then on the nice dry coach and we came in via the Millhouses Park entrance to Sheffield, not many there enjoying outdoor bowls.

So it was back to the centre after a wonderful friendly picnic with lots of food and drink who could ask for more.
