<u>NATIONAL EYE HEALTH</u> <u>WEEK</u>

19th to 25th September

This is an annual event with the intention of raising awareness of the importance of looking after sight through good eye health. It is currently estimated that 50% of

sight loss in the UK is potentially avoidable through simple lifestyle choices.

Our Mobile Information Unit will be in Barnsley town centre on Thursday 22nd September and we are busy planning other events across Sheffield City Region for that week.

WORLD SIGHT DAY

Thursday 13th October

This is another day when we will be promoting the importance of good eye health through events currently being planned.

ONLINE TODAY

This is a Big Lottery funded project being delivered by Action for Blind People. It consists of a half day course in how to use an Apple or Android smartphone or tablet, regardless of how much or how little sight you have. You will learn how to use magnification and/or speech to enable you to access every feature of the device. We have a number of courses scheduled over the next few months with an absolute beginner's course in the morning, starting at 10am and a course for existing users in the afternoon starting at 2pm. The course dates are 24th August (both sessions fully booked), 26th September and 25th October. Further courses can be arranged, subject to demand.

your place, stating whether you require the beginner's or advanced course. People booking for the advanced course are encouraged to bring their own device with them.

ACTIVITY CENTRE

Here is a message from David, SRSB's Activity Centre Manager.

The Activity Centre clients have enjoyed several trips out in our minibuses so far this summer. We have been to Ladybower, Forge Dam, the Millennium Gardens and the Moor Market several times. Clients have said that "it's a good thing that they are arranged... hope there are many more to come because everyone seemed to enjoy them." Ladybower was described as "beautiful, with lots of ducks and a most enjoyable trip." Another client reported, "we get to places we never normally would, we are lucky to have people to take us." I have to thank the drivers, staff, volunteers, and placement students for supporting these trips. One comment about a trip to the Moor Market was, "I got everything that I needed and had two fabulous helpers", and people "felt looked after" on their trips into the countryside. A trip to Graves Park went down well, "it was very enjoyable and interesting seeing all the farm animals."

The Sheffield Children's Hospital elephants have proved popular

whenever we have come across them, particularly in the Winter Garden. One client thought that they were real at first but a closer inspection revealed that "whoever decorated them did a good job...very colourful and artistic". We were told by one client that "the Winter Garden had too many trees" and someone else commented that "there were too many ducks" at Ladybower. However, we do try and please as many clients as we can as often as we can; we all do our best. As a final comment about our trips out, "I enjoyed them all, every single one!"

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TEAM

Mobile Information Unit

What was meant to be a perfect summer event for the MIU on 2nd July at Ruskin Park in Walkley turned into a table-top event in Walkley Carnegie Library, in order to avoid the torrential rainfall.

There was plenty of interactive engagement with the very friendly Walkley community, with lots of people exploring the effects of Simspecs and discussing Make Sense of Walkley, a sensory walk organised by Julie Turnbull, our Mobile Information Officer, for Wednesday 6th July as part of the Year of Making. In the end there was just too much competition from the Euro football game featuring Portugal v Wales plus Andy Murray playing a particularly exciting match against Jo-Wilfred Tsonga, so it was a small turnout of 5 participants who took to the streets of Walkley to explore its sensory wonders.

The discoveries that emerged from our wanderings are a starting point for a really rich project that can take place in any community with anyone wanting to get to know their local places and spaces through tapping into the wider range of senses beyond vision that we tend to largely ignore.

Julie is hoping to build on this pilot version in Walkley, and to create an interactive walk in the autumn from SRSB at Mappin Street, once the University has finished all the paving reconstruction and the road system in the Mappin Street area has been reorganised. VISIT TO SIGHT VILLAGE

One of SRSB's clients, Mike Salter, has written a small article on the day trip to Birmingham Sight Village. We had all arrived, were together in the welcoming reception area of SRSB and talking about our expectations regarding the event, Liz and Rob were checking us in and making sure that we all had cold drinks with us, as the day was forecast to be very hot.

Then an emergency occurred, one of our member's was suddenly taken ill with a heart problem, Liz quietly and calmly saw to him, found out the problem from both him and his wife, and called both the ambulance service and a paramedic and after a brief examination, he was taken to hospital accompanied by his wife.

We then boarded the minibus, safely guided, then we sat in our seats, were safety checked re: seatbelts, then Liz took the driving seat, and Rob took up the shotgun position beside her, and off we went.

On the journey to Sight Village there was pleasant chatter amongst us stating what our expectations were about the event that we were visiting. There was also chatter between the three in front, namely Liz, Rob and Satnav.

All went well, then we arrived in Birmingham, near where we would turn into the carpark, there were road repair works, Liz found a way round them and we were safely in the car park. We were met by the welcome team, and handed goody bags also a layout plan, those who needed a guide were allocated one.

It was the 23rd year of the exhibition, I think, the best, there were more exhibitors, a better layout, as well as English companies there was a German, Swedish and a Chinese company represented.

In addition to the exhibition there was a full program of seminars and workshops taking place.

New for 2016, British Blind Sport had taken over part of the exhibition to host an area dedicated to inclusive sport, and offered visitors a chance to take part in judo, tennis, goalball and acoustic shooting.

There were bargains to be had, Associated Optical were offering 37.5% off a few of their products, Sight and Sound Technology also had good offers available.

The refreshments and drinks had plenty of customers, especially for cold drinks!

We had a pleasant ride home to base, though a hot one, and plenty of chatter about the Village. All told it was a good day out.

LIVING WITH SIGHT LOSS COURSE

In conjunction with Action for Blind People, SRSB is running a new, free, four-day course, to help people living with sight loss become more aware of the wide range of support services available on both a practical and emotional level. Aimed at people who may be newly diagnosed with sight loss, as well as those who have been living with sight loss for longer, this course takes place over four weeks and will be held at SRSB's Mappin Street centre.

Here are the course dates and topics covered:

Week 1: Tuesday 20th September: Welcome, Introduction to Services and Welfare Rights

Week 2: Tuesday 27th September: Mobility and Daily Living, Leisure

Week 3: Tuesday 4th October: Eye Health and Emotional Wellbeing

Week 4: Tuesday 18th October: Leisure and Next Steps

The course starts at 10:15am and ends at 3:30pm. It is best to know that you can attend all four sessions in order to get the most out of this course. SRSB will be running this or a similar course again next year if you are interested but can't attend this time.

HOW TO MAXIMISE YOUR DONATIONS TO SRSB

For all charities, but particularly a small local one such as SRSB,

donations represent a substantial chunk of our annual income, money without which we could not provide services and activities for our clients. Potentially you could donate 25% more to us with no further cost to you, by simply signing up for Gift Aid.

Many people are confused about what Gift Aid entails. You are eligible to Gift Aid if you pay income tax or capital gains tax. Before you sign up for Gift Aid you must have paid in tax for that year the same amount you want to Gift Aid – that means that if you donate £10, you must have paid £2.50 tax.

Other than signing a Gift Aid declaration in favour of SRSB there is nothing more for you to do and we then claim the Gift Aid direct from HMRC. If you happen to be a higher rate tax payer then you can also claim back the higher rate tax on any donations you make.

SENIOR SNIPPETS

Welcome to the latest edition of Senior Snippets: the monthly advisory column with the older members of our community in mind, brought to you by Bryn Evans Director of Home Instead Senior Care in Sheffield and Barnsley.

Due to July being Fraud Awareness Month, this instalment will deliver simple steps you can take in order to protect you as well as elderly family from falling victim to the vast array of scams that defraud 3.2 million people in the UK each year.

One simple rule: A simple rule of thumb you should always remember is to "never provide information in a phone call that you did not initiate" – this may include personal information or agreeing to give money over the phone.

Protect your information: Under no circumstances ever give information regarding your bank account to someone you don't know. It is important to keep personal documents, plastic cards and chequebooks in a safe and secure place, and even if you know the person you're emailing, never email your financial information. Finally, if you're sending personal information on the internet, assure that the website address starts https, not http.

Create complex passwords: Longer passwords with a combination of letters and digits are very difficult to guess. Change passwords regularly and don't share them with anyone. Provide support with mail: Ask your elderly friend or relative to gather all the post together so that you can help them sort through it when you are there. Find a place where the person can keep the mail together which will in turn prompt them to wait for you to help them sort their mail.

Dispose of important documents: it is essential to discard documents that could be useful to criminals, including bank statements, credit card statements and other financial information by shredding them. Important documentation such as tax returns and car documents should be stored in a safe place and out of sight.

Don't open suspicious looking emails: If you get mail that looks unusual it is likely to be a scam. It is important not to reply to the email, as well as not to click on any links in the email or open any attachments. If you have already clicked on a link and opened a website, don't give any personal information out.

Neighbourhood Alert Service: Your local area may operate a Neighbourhood Alert Service, which is used by police and Trading Standards to circulate messages about doorstep crime and scams. Register for free www.neighbourhoodalert.co.uk

If you think that someone has been scammed or is at risk of being

scammed, make sure to contact Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or www.actionfraud.police.uk.

There's something for everyone, a great lunchtime treat! Bill is a client and supporter of SRSB – he started to lose his sight many years ago. However from the age of 50 when he went completely blind in one eye, he discovered that his creative talent on the piano suddenly "magnified by a factor of 10" and he also discovered he has synaesthesia, meaning that he sees the keys on the piano as different colours.

Bill's involvement with SRSB began, like many people, at a very low point in his life when he was registered as severely sight impaired.

He'd had to give up work as a dentist after a successful career; a period in his life which he now describes as very difficult time. But time, as he says, "gives you perspective" and in Bill's case it's also given him the chance to develop his musical talents.

"I've always been a creative type. I learned piano as a child and was Grade 8 by the time I was 18, but I felt I wasn't good enough to be a professional, and I always had to have sheet music when I played – even for a simple tune such as Happy Birthday.

"But when I was 50 it was just like I'd had some musical download. That's the only way I can explain it. It was as if so much of my brain was being used to process visual information, that the sight loss gave it the space for the music.

"Now if I hear a tune on the radio I can sit down and play it, although the harmonies take a little longer."

The new skill of playing without written music and playing by ear, developed into improvisation and then Bill discovered an ability for writing music of his own. His first composition was inspired by the Sheffield Flood.

Bill has also written a book about sight loss. "I think the creativity has helped with the sight loss. You go through all the stages, I've come to an acceptance of how things are. I had all this anger, then a week of grieving and I have been fine ever since. There are so many things I am interested in," said Bill.

As well as his music, Bill takes great strength from his Christian faith, and he also presents a weekly radio show on Sheffield Live.
