LIVING WITH SIGHT LOSS COURSE

Organised by Liz Bowman, Community Engagement Officer, and aimed at anyone living with impaired vision. This was a pilot run for SRSB to host a course with Action for Blind People. Addressing welfare rights, support services, mobility, daily living, leisure, eye health, emotional wellbeing and next steps, the course actively encouraged the participants to work together in a supportive environment to explore their feelings and attitudes to their sight impairment experience, and to work on strategies to develop confidence levels in all aspects of life. The feedback from the 12 who took part was very positive, Viv, who attended, commented "The most useful thing for me was speaking

to other people in a similar situation to me and learning information I didn't know. The course has just been marvellously well organised".

There will be a coffee and information morning on Tuesday 29th November, 10:30am to 12noon at **SRSB** Mappin Street for anyone interested in signing up for the next LWSL course which will be held Spring time 2017. This will be a chance to meet and chat with people who've already done the course this year and for past course participants to meet up again socially.

Message from a volunteer

"My name is Mariam Hassan. I am currently a Volunteer at **SRSB**. I was a former work placement student at the beginning of the year, and had successfully completed my two weeks at **SRSB**. I then decided to come back and become a Volunteer.

My reason for volunteering was because I love the environment at **SRSB**, I also wanted to make a difference there; likewise I put a smile on the clients', volunteers' and staff members' faces and I wanted to give back to the community. I love the atmosphere in **SRSB** and also felt absolutely welcomed when I completed my placement.

As a volunteer my duties are ensuring the clients that come in each time and every time have a spontaneous time. Another reason why I volunteer is because it's rewarding. I am aware that even if the clients only attend once a week, they come into **SRSB** and it's a place where they can fully enjoy themselves; interact with other clients and their friends at **SRSB**.

I also help out in the Activity Centre with serving food and drinks, planning activities for the clients to do, working with other staff members and volunteers as teamwork is essential and similarly play cards with the clients and lastly going out to places such as the countryside, the market and cafés with the clients."

ONLINE TODAY

This is a Big Lottery funded project being delivered by Action for Blind People. It consists of a half day course in how to use an Apple or Android smartphone or tablet, regardless of how much or how little sight you have. You will learn how to use magnification and/or speech to enable you to access every feature of the device.

Following the success of the courses in August and October we have a further course scheduled for 7 February 2017 with an absolute beginner's course in the morning, starting at 10am and a course for existing users in the afternoon starting at 1pm.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Little Sparklers

<u>CHARLES BONNET</u> SYNDROME (CBS) SUPPORT GROUP UPDATE

Charles Bonnet Syndrome is not a cause of sight loss, more a result of sight loss, but this worrying condition causes hallucinations, resulting in people, or their family/friends, wrongly believing that they may have mental health problems.

Our group recently took on two new participants who we are sure will benefit from joining and meeting people who are experiencing similar symptoms to them. Our group often provides huge relief for people who have struggled with this condition and found it hard to discuss with others. It means that people can speak freely with others who understand. As well as being a discussion group, we also pass on other relevant information.

It is hard to believe it is nearly a year since I was invited to the Houses of Parliament for the launch of a new website called Esme's Umbrella, which is a campaign group for everyone working towards a greater awareness of Charles Bonnet Syndrome. The website is a source of information and advice for people with the condition. For example there is a PDF that you can download to take to your doctor if you suspect that you may be suffering from CBS. They meet every Thursday at our Mappin Street Centre from 10:30am to 2:30pm and provides an opportunity for up to 12 deafblind people to meet on a social basis in an environment that takes account of their specialist communication needs.

The group is run by Rachel Kelly, a trained guide communicator with

signing skills, with support from volunteers. They ensure that the members of the group enjoy a range of activities and outings.

Refreshments are served and there is no charge for attending. A two course lunch, cooked in our own kitchen, is available at the subsidised price of £4.

WARM HOME DISCOUNT SCHEME

For Winter 2016 to 2017 you could get £140 off your electricity bill through the Warm Home Discount Scheme. The money isn't paid to you but credited to your electricity bill between October and April; it does not affect the Winter Fuel Payment or Cold Weather Payments. To qualify you have to be receiving the Guarantee Credit element of Pension Credit. Your supplier will advise you how to apply. If below pension age but in receipt of certain means tested benefits or on a low income, please check with your supplier. In either case if you have any problems or have any questions about the Warm Home Discount Scheme please contact SRSB.

CITY HALL CONCESSIONARY CARER'S TICKET

Whilst Sheffield Theatres provide free tickets for 1 carer with a visually impaired person, the City Hall had not provided this concession until January this year. There has been some confusion over what evidence the City

Hall requires in order to provide this concession but this has now been clarified.

People who wish to take advantage of this concession need to register with the City Hall that they are eligible for the concession and once they have done this all tickets purchased by them will benefit from a free carer ticket. There are various things that the City Hall will accept as evidence but the simplest piece of evidence is a Visual Impairment Mobility Pass (Bus Pass with the "eye symbol"). You need to take this in to the City Hall box office.

For any visits to City Hall organised by our Culture Club, Joanne will need to give them the names of visually impaired people when placing the booking so it is important that you register with City Hall prior to the booking being made.

TANDEM RIDING AT THE VELODROME

Here is a quick word from Ken Bower.

"On Thursday 25 August Jane, Adam, Carol and Myself travelled over the Pennines to the Velodrome in Manchester for a training session on a fixed tandem prior to a fundraising event for **SRSB** whose original idea and brainwave was Eric Andrews which will occur on 12 November.

After signing in, we caught the lift down to the racing track and awaited further instructions.

Andy one of the experienced volunteers was assigned to myself with Geoff another experienced volunteer being assigned to Carol.

We both preferred to wear our trainers with our feet being strapped onto the pedals rather than use their steel cleats which click into the pedals and are the preferred footwear which the trainers use. We were also issued with safety helmets which could be adjusted for all sizes of head.

The tandems were leaned up against the safety rail as we climbed aboard. We had to use our left hand to steady ourselves prior to setting off The trainers emphasised how important it was to pedal at all times in unison if possible so that the tandem would travel around the 250 metres of wooden track smoothly as there are no brakes or gears to control the tandem as the speeding up and slowing down is achieved by pedal control alone.

It was very warm and hard work as we hurtled around the track and I was running out of breath towards the close of the initial session.

Andy informed me that we would shortly be stopping and instructed me to pedal much slower in order to decrease our speed prior to coming to a stop. We sauntered up to the safety rail and grabbed it to stop the momentum as it is dangerous to place your foot back on the floor with fixed bikes.

Following a short break to take in fluid and regain our breath, we mounted the tandem once more. This time it became much easier to pedal than our initial effort with the trainers being more confident of our ability steering us up then hurtling down the bank at a rate of knots.

Having circled around the track for around 10 minutes, we had a short break before mounting the tandem for the final time giving it all that we had and travelling the fastest of the three sessions.

We both found it a terrific experience and felt elated that we had participated in this novel event and grateful for the opportunity of testing ourselves. This challenge is being organised in support of **SRSB** by one of our clients and supporters. A team of blind and partially sighted riders will be riding tandem cycles at the velodrome in support of **SRSB** for this challenge.

We will bring you a full update in the next newsletter.
