RNIB Talking Books is celebrating its 80th birthday by making the service completely free for all blind and partially sighted children and adults in the UK. Every year RNIB Talking Books provides more than 1million audiobooks to people with sight loss. There are over 23,000 titles to choose from so there will be something for everyone. You can choose to receive your books on DAISY CD (one book per disc) or USB stick (three books per stick) depending on your personal taste. # Benefits changes

There have been many changes to existing benefits and more are anticipated in the future so if you have any queries, or particularly if you have

any forms that require completion, please do not hesitate to contact us so that we can arrange for a Community Advice Officer to speak with you. Personal Independence Payment is gradually replacing Disability Living Allowance for people born after 8th April 1948. This has already started and people are being contacted by the DWP; over the coming months everyone will gradually be transferred to the new benefit. You will be contacted by the DWP and given instructions on what you need to do and the process involved. We would strongly urge you to contact us before responding to any correspondence.

# **Charles Bonnet Syndrome**

Representatives of SRSB were invited to the launch of a new website for a campaign group for everyone working towards a greater awareness of Charles Bonnet Syndrome. The website is called Esme's Umbrella and it was started by Judith Potts, whose mother Esme, had Charles Bonnet Syndrome.

Judith Potts was at the launch of the website which took place at the House of Commons along with Bessie Goddard who is the person at SRSB who runs the Charles Bonnet Syndrome support group at our Mappin Street Centre. As far as we know this is the only support group in the country for the condition at the time of writing this article. # **Tactile Paving Consultation**

Last November we held a successful consultation about the Department of Transport proposals for the revised guidance on the use of tactile paving.

We submitted our responses after a detailed and thorough discussion. These are currently being considered along with all other submissions. We will let you know when we hear any more.

#### **Tram Train rail works**

Essential weekend engineering works to prepare Sheffield's tramlines for Tram Train will continue over the next few months putting the innovative UK pilot scheme on track to run between Sheffield and Rotherham from 2017.

Revised timetables and services are planned to operate on the Yellow and Purple Supertram Routes on 13, 14, 27 and 28 February 2016. Blue Route Supertram services between Malin Bridge and Halfway are unaffected.

Dedicated YX, Y1 and L1 bus services will replace trams during the works. Replacement bus service timetables and information can be found online at supertram.com and travelsouthyorkshire.com; on Twitter

@SCSupertram and @TSYalerts; via Traveline on **01709 51 51 51**; and on posters at tram stops.

Passengers in South Yorkshire will be the first in the country to benefit from pioneering Tram Trains that will provide a direct service from Sheffield city centre to Rotherham Central and Parkgate, travelling on street tramlines and the national rail network.

# **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TEAM**

# **MIU and Community Engagement Activity**

The MIU and Community Engagement Team, with invaluable support from their enthusiastic and knowledgeable VIP volunteers, have been out and

about over the winter months attending a range of events and venues across Sheffield.

Recent highlights include supporting a 'Healthy, Wealthy and Warm' Event in Heeley, where the team spoke to local people and a group learning English about how to keep your eyes healthy, followed by a day at Totley Farmers' Market promoting the services of **SRSB** and demonstrating equipment that can help people with sight loss. A conference of Sheffield's Health and Practice Champions provided a perfect opportunity to raise the profile of the Mobile Information Service to voluntary community health organisations from across the city. This resulted in further bookings at a Women's Health Day in Sharrow and the 'Beat the Winter Blues' event in Lowedges where the eye health and SRSB's services messages reached two very diverse communities.

Julie Turnbull, the new Mobile Information Officer, has also built links with Sheffield Carer's organisation, Dementia Action Alliance and City Taxis and is busy filling the spring and summer diary of events with a range of exciting new projects, including taking the MIU along to Sheffield's popular 'Park Runs' on Saturday mornings.

# 'Optimeyes' Project

Community Engagement Officer, Liz Bowman, is also the project worker for 'Optimeyes'. This is a regional joint project working with other sight loss organisations from Hull, South Lincs, York, and North Yorkshire in partnership with RNIB to share good

practice and ideas about new ways to identify and help members of the public who may already be suffering a degree of sight loss but are unaware of the support services available at SRSB or their local sight loss charity. This two year Lottery Funded project, targeting the 50+ age group, also focuses on passing on information about how to keep your eyes healthy, the importance of diet, exercise and regular eye checks and trying to stop or reduce smoking. Much of this work takes place through community outreach engagement events and the Mobile Information Unit so Liz and Julie are particularly interested in hearing from any groups whose members fall predominantly in the fifty plus age range who may wish to book an eye health talk or visit from the community engagement team.

# Volunteers welcome in the Community Engagement Team

The 'Optimeyes' project also focuses on building the confidence of clients with sight loss, not only around everyday living skills but also by encouraging them to become volunteers or join in with campaigns for change and improvement to services that affect visually impaired and blind people. Some of our clients and beneficiaries from the first year of the project are already active volunteers on the Mobile Information Unit and help with community talks and visual impairment awareness training, passing on their own experiences and advice to both the public at large and those more recently diagnosed with an eye condition. Others have become

group leaders, peer mentors or telephone befrienders. We welcome any new enquiries or offers of help from clients and supporters, old and new, about getting more involved with volunteering for the Community Engagement Team. Training and full support will be provided and travel/ lunch expenses where applicable.

# **Visual Impairment Awareness Training**

Julie and Liz have recently taken over the role of delivering Visual Impairment Awareness training. They started in January by training Home Safety Officers at South Yorkshire Fire and Rescue Service how to recognise signs that someone may be finding everyday tasks more difficult due to sight loss. This can be done during their fire safety home visit checks, and has already proved successful as half a dozen people have already been referred to **SRSB** this year. **SRSB** is also interested in hearing from any other potential partners who may be able to offer help in extending the range of referral routes available to people with sight loss in Sheffield who are not currently aware of SRSB's services.

A final reminder that both the MIU service and Community Engagement Officer can be booked, free of charge, to visit your group or organisation. We also offer a simple, non-medical vision screening test as part of our service if required.
