Mobile Information Unit

Our mobile unit has been busy throughout the summer at various events and venues, informing the general public about how to look after their eyesight and the support services available from **SRSB.** Liz Bowman who launched this service a year ago is having a slight change of role with **SRSB** but more of this later in the newsletter under the heading of "staff".

RP Support Group

Welfare Benefits

Winter payments

For winter 2015 to 2016 you could get £140 off your electricity bill through the Warm Home Discount Scheme and it is a one-off discount on your electricity bill, usually between September and March. The discount will not affect your Cold Weather Payment or Winter Fuel Payment if applicable.

To be entitled to the discount the electricity bill has to be in either your

name or your partner's and you have to be receiving either Guarantee Pension Credit, income related Employment and Support Allowance or Job Seeker's Allowance, or Income Support. Most providers are part of the Scheme.

As the providers can access details from the DWP in relation to the Scheme it should be awarded automatically; you should receive a letter by 24 December 2015 either confirming this, or inviting you to apply by 29 January 2016. If you do not get a letter but think that you may be eligible you can contact the Warm Home Discount Team on **0345 603 9439**.

Benefits changes

There have been many changes to existing benefits and more are anticipated in the future so if you have any queries, or particularly if you have any forms that require completion, please do not hesitate to contact us so that we can arrange for a Community Advice Officer to speak with you. Personal Independence Payment is gradually replacing Disability Living Allowance for working age recipients. This has already started and people are being contacted by the DWP; over the coming months everyone will gradually be transferred to the new benefit. You will be contacted by the DWP and given instructions on what you need to do and the process involved. We would strongly urge you to contact us before responding to any correspondence.

Drop in sessions

We hold a regular drop in session every Monday. One of our Community Advice Officers is available from 9:30am to 4pm. This has proved popular most Mondays and has enabled people to be seen more quickly than if they had to wait for an appointment. So if you have any queries, problems regarding benefits, housing, support, equipment etc or just want to have a look around our Centre, then feel free to pop in or give us a ring to have a chat.

Cairn Home

It always receives excellent reviews when inspected by the Care Quality Commission, Sheffield City Council etc but the nicest review we have seen was done by Healthwatch Sheffield, an independent watchdog. Contact the Elderly

This is a charity which changes the lives of people aged 75 and over who live alone and cannot get out on their own. They are solely dedicated to tackling loneliness and social isolation among older people.

Supported by a network of volunteers, the charity organises monthly Sunday afternoon tea parties for small groups of older people, aged 75 and over, who live alone, offering a regular and vital friendship link every month.

Each older person is collected from their home by a volunteer driver and taken to a volunteer host's home for the afternoon. The group is warmly welcomed by a different host each month, but the drivers remain the same which means that over the months and years, acquaintances turn into friends and loneliness is replaced by companionship.

Their tea parties are a real lifeline of friendship for their older guests who have little or no contact with family or friends. They bring people of all ages together, develop fulfilling friendships and support networks, and give everyone involved something to look forward to each month.

EYECAN PROJECT UPDATE

Computer Training

As usual we are offering a computer class for visually impaired people, however this course is for people that have some useful sight remaining. This takes place at the Limbrick Centre in Hillsborough.

This is because there is no specialist technology available.

Having said that the staff are great and we are able to produce the work books in large print.

If you are able to read this newsletter in 16 point print format you should be able to take part in these classes. The classes run for 10 weeks and each session lasts for 2 hours. You need to be able to get to Hillsborough as this is where the classes are held.

Pottery Class

In the last issue we asked for people to contact us if you have an interest in attending a pottery class.

A number of people contacted me which allowed me to talk with the hosts and tutor of these classes.

I have not been able to contact every one as I had problems with my emails for a while so here is an update.

The art studio is in the city centre, accessible by public transport. There have been many discussions with people interested in a pottery class which is now being planned for April next year. However due to the cost of hiring the art studio and the tutor we need to ensure that we have enough participants to share the costs and also a commitment to attend regularly.

The course will consist of 8 weekly sessions of 2 hours duration with a cost of £15 per person for each session a total cost for the course of £120.

Once the art studio and tutor is booked I am committed to paying for the full 8 weeks so I will therefore be asking for payment in full before the course starts. If you would like to start paying by instalments please do not hesitate to contact me.

When Christine was recuperating from surgery for a brain tumour, she was introduced to an artist who encouraged her to draw. Little did she realise at the time, how this rekindled passion would develop into a prolific collection of drawings and lead to exhibitions of her work.

Surgeons removed Christine's left eye and rebuilt her face, and she now has no sense of smell or taste.

"My art keeps me going," she explained. I am passionate about art and about animals, and drawing them has helped me to rebuild my life."

CAMPAIGNS & ISSUES

Tactile Paving Consultation

The Department of Transport are currently considering changing their guidance on the use of tactile paving in certain situations and currently are in the consultation phase. In order that we can give them an informed response from as many blind and partially sighted people as possible we are holding our own consultation event on Tuesday 24th November 2015, 2pm at our Mappin Street Centre. Bus Route changes

By the time you are reading this you will have found out that there are many changes to bus routes.

People from the passenger transport executive held two information days about these changes at our Mappin Street Centre. These were very helpful to the participants. We had a route by route discussion to the changes.

We only had a few people attend which was a bit disappointing because of how many people use the buses, but having said that for the eight or so people that did attend we were able to ask questions about our own routes. If many more people had come it would have taken so much more time, the meeting was planned for an hour and a half, but after two hours we drew the meeting to a close.

So a big thank you to Paula and Mike from South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive (SYPTE) the latter of whom has an excellent knowledge of the bus network in the South Yorkshire area.

If you need to find out details about the changes please ring Traveline on **01709 51 51 51.** We were also told that new staff have also been employed to help with the increased volume of calls to this service.

Bus Concessions

SYPTE have recently carried out a further consultation about their services and the local benefits for people with bus passes. **SRSB** held

our own consultation events over 3 days with 52 people participating and we had some great feedback from you so thank you to everybody that made time to attend. Whilst many of you have submitted your own responses to the consultation **SRSB also** made a submission on behalf of all the people present at our events.

We are now awaiting SYPTE's proposals following the consultation. Hopefully there will not be any proposal to change local travel concessions but if there are any such proposals we will be contacting people again to consider how we should campaign to retain the concessions which are so vital in enabling people to maintain their independence.

Orange Wallets for VI Bus Passes

We had been getting reports that people were not getting an orange wallet issued with their visually impaired bus pass. There has been a gap while SYPTE reviewed their use.

As drivers have been trained to recognise that if a person holds out an orange wallet – then they should recognise that the person is visually impaired and give appropriate assistance. Because they are so useful to drivers and visually impaired travellers SYPTE have now ordered new wallets which should be available in the near future.

NHS Complaints Advocacy

VoiceAbility is a new service which exists to help people who need to make a complaint about healthcare in Sheffield. While most people are confident enough to make complaints for themselves some people including children and young may not feel they are able to or may feel that they are not being listened to. They could also support visually impaired people with writing letters and attending meetings. VoiceAbility can appoint an independent advocate who can guide you through the process and discuss the different options with you.

Get Involved in Adult Social Care – Quality Improvement Network

Sheffield City Council's Adult Social Care services highly value the views of people who use their services and their family carers. They also welcome the views of those who arrange and pay for their own care and support (selffunders). They want to work with you to make improvements to services and the information we provide.

There are various ways that you can choose to get involved and have your say when you join the Quality Improvement Network. These include:

- Joining one of the Service Improvement Forums where along with senior managers you'll check up on the quality of services and work with the council officers to set priorities and plan for the future. They have forums for :
- Carers
- Disabled adults and older people
- People with a learning disability
- People with a mental health condition

If you have an eye for detail you can help the council improve their information at our friendly and informal Readers Group – adjustments are made for people with visual impairments.

Or you can simply receive a briefing paper and get in touch if you have views on what's happening. This is available in large print, audio CD and Braille.

The council will provide support and adjustments for you to attend including paying out of pocket expenses for things like travel and personal assistants. For more information or to get involved please contact:

SERVICES AND ACTIVITIES AT SRSB MAPPIN STREET CENTRE

Activities Centre

Do you live alone, or do you want a day away from your spouse or family? If so, why not try our Activities Centre. We can usually provide door to door transport with our minibuses, you will get refreshments, a home cooked lunch, a range of activities and most importantly, have some company with people, maybe even make some new friends. If you would like to try the Activities Centre please give us a call and we will arrange for one of our Community Advice Officers to visit you and provide more details.

Minibus

For passengers on Dennis' minibus, which is now over 12 years old, we have some good news. We have been fortunate to receive funding from Department of Transport for a brand new minibus to replace Dennis' bus which is nearing the end of its economic life. We placed the order for the new minibus in October but by the time the van has been delivered from Germany and then gone to the firm that converts it to a minibus it is likely to be March/April 2016 before we take delivery of it. Fingers crossed that the old bus lasts that long!

Equipment Centre

One of the popular products is RNIB's Penfriend which is an audio labelling device and which came out a few years ago. This has just been upgraded to Penfriend 2 which we have in stock for demonstration and sale - price is £74.99.
