Bank Cash Machines (ATMs)

Barclays Bank, the first major bank to sign up to the RNIB 'Make Money Talk' campaign has fulfilled its commitment and now more than 75 per cent of its ATMs "talk." Blind and partially sighted people can now take along their earphones and plug them into one of more than 3,000 Barclays speech enabled ATMs, and access their money.

To use the new technology customers need to plug in a set of earphones to the audio jack and privately listen into the options that will be read out. People will be given several choices and asked to press the appropriate option on the key pad. For instance, a customer may be asked to press 'one' to select cash withdrawal and 'two' to select balance enquiry. On each key pad the 'five' has a raised dot which enables people with sight loss to navigate the key pad. To find out the location of your nearest machine visit: http://ask.barclays.co.uk/branchfinder/ We can tell you that most Sheffield branches of Barclays have a talking cash machine and Barclays cash machines at supermarkets also talk. You just need to take with you your own headphones which have a 3.5mm jack plug (this is standard for most lightweight headphones).

And finally, although other banks have yet to make the same commitment to talking cash machines, remember that anybody can use a Barclays cash machine, you do not need to be a Barclays customer.

CAMPAIGNS

Stop for Me, Speak to Me

This is a national campaign coordinated by RNIB aimed to improve visually impaired people's experience of bus travel. Their national survey highlighted a number of issues which were a problem across the country and with all bus operators. (For more info see http://digbig.com/5bgydc)

We recently held a meeting with RNIB, visually impaired people from across South Yorkshire, and senior executives from SYPTE, and the bus operators Stagecoach and First.

The biggest problem is getting the right bus to stop and for visually impaired travellers to identify which bus is which. There are particular

problems where two buses stop one behind the other at a stop. There are also problems in getting drivers to give clear information.

The representatives from the bus companies acknowledged the concerns that were aired, and are clearly very keen to make a lot of improvements.

Both First and Stagecoach confirmed that they do have a policy that drivers should stop at all stops for that service if anyone is waiting. They also regard 'customer care' as a priority for all drivers and accept that some drivers do not live up to the high standards expected of them.

They are taking the concerns back to their companies to make plans to improve their policies and training. We hope to arrange further meetings and public events with them.

In the meantime please let us have your feedback on your experiences of bus travel. We can raise issues on your behalf. We would also be very pleased to hear about your positive experiences where a driver has been especially good as the companies are keen to praise high standards and raise other staff to the same level. HOLIDAYS, DAY TRIPS AND OTHER OUTINGS

Holiday to Lytham St Anne's, September 2012

Our holiday started at **SRSB**'s Mappin Street centre where we all met up ready to join the coach and were bemoaning the weather as the heavens opened. The coach was delayed due to flooding en-route but we were all in holiday mood and determined to enjoy ourselves. While waiting several of us availed ourselves of the VIP cafe and had lunch. And we all mingled, chatted and caught up on the latest topics of interest.

When the coach arrived we were greeted by our courier Jilly and driver Paul. Ours was the last "pick up" so we had a comfortable, uninterrupted journey arriving in St. Anne's some two and a half hours later to be met by the very helpful Langdales Hotel staff and served tea and coffee in the ballroom while our luggage was unloaded and taken to our rooms.

After a quick change it was time for dinner, a varied menu throughout the week, and the entertainment later that first evening was provided by an accordion player/singer, preceded by the inevitable Bingo!

The following day, Tuesday, we were off to Southport straight after breakfast where some of our party spent time in the market, shopping arcades and antique centre in the famous Lord Street. Others spent time in cafes watching the world go by.

Meanwhile, back at the Langdales Hotel there was a tea dance, open to the public, which was enjoyed by those of our group who chose not to go to Southport.

It was back to the hotel by a scenic route in the afternoon where our courier and driver kept us entertained with a running commentary, passing

through small villages (eg Kirkham), passing the Lytham windmill, pointing out places of interest and farmland that looked for all the world like paddyfields and lakes as far as the eye could see, under inches of flood water.

After dinner we were taken on a tour of Blackpool Illuminations which are spectacular and took us back to our childhoods! There were animated tableaux of nursery rhymes etc., a tribute to Neill Armstrong, references to the Queen's Jubilee along the route and all the way fantastic overhead displays on every lamp post and building. The trams were all lit up, moving and decorated - one as a boat, another as a train and a large rocket. The display went all the way from the Pleasure Beach to Squires Gate. There was less congestion on the Promenade than expected but it still took us well over 2 hours to traverse the whole and then return the same way, so we saw the show from all angles. All the time Jilly was describing the display for the benefit of those who could not see it all.

On Wednesday morning we set off on our planned outing to Skipton market. The weather was a little improved and there were open air market stalls, lots of shops/boutiques/ a craft and antique fair and plenty of goodies to buy. Away from the market square Holy Trinity church was an oasis of peace where several of us rested and reflected a while. One disappointment apparently was that the fantastic castle was only open from 10am-12pm so there was insufficient time to visit it. There were lots of cafes and the

Church Vestry tearooms for our party to refresh themselves.

Then it was back to the coach and Paul took us on a scenic trip of the countryside including the Vale of Bowland and surrounding moors and farmland. On our journey back there was a short hold up due to a flooded road, but while the police sorted out the traffic we occupied ourselves with a few jokes, a name game, a bit of a sing-song and tea/coffee were made for us by Jilly and Paul. The evening entertainment that night was provided by a very good singer.

Our itinerary for the next day, Thursday, took us to the Lake District. Once again Jilly and Paul gave us a commentary on the way. We passed through Ambleside and stopped first at Grasmere where the poet Wordsworth lived. His family are buried in St. Oswald's churchyard there. The church is well worth a visit and next door to it is Wordsworth's Daffodil Garden.

There's also the famous Grasmere Gingerbread on sale in the village which is made in what was once the tiny village school.

From Grasmere we went through Bowness/Windermere and stopped at Bowness where, with the weather being a bit kinder, several of us went for a cruise on Lake Windermere. Others sat by the lake and were entertained by the resident swans and yet others wandered around the little shops and cafes.

Those who stayed in St. Anne's explored the town, several "shopped until they dropped," went on the beach, down onto the Pier or into the Ashton Gardens which were directly opposite the hotel (but rather waterlogged to say the least!) For anyone who didn't want or were not able to go far the hotel provided refreshments all through the day. It was only a short distance from the amenities and all the staff were very helpful.

Meanwhile - as we were returning from Bowness we passed through more spectacular scenery, moors and mountains, even more fields turned into enormous lakes with all the flooding and we were told to expect "a surprise" that evening.

Knowing we were leaving early the next morning and not wishing to miss the evening's entertainment I hastily packed as much as I could before going down to dinner - and it's a good job I did for the singer/comedian Jason and his wife Shirley kept us so helpless with laughter it was 11pm before some of us reluctantly started back to our rooms. The hotel owner, a member of staff and our driver dressed up as nuns and a priest and acted out a parody of "How Do You Solve a Problem Like Maria" to music from "The Sound of Music." This was followed by another costume change where, to the strains of "Hiawatha" Paul as the Indian brave and a "squaw" acted out the story with Paul "swimming" across the river (floor) to meet his "love." The whole evening was hilarious and a lovely finish to our stay.

On the journey home on Friday morning there was a free raffle with several prizes. We arrived back at Mappin Street about lunchtime where as usual our stalwart Olwen was waiting for us, helping wherever necessary and ordering taxis for those who wanted them.

Despite the weather it was a lovely holiday. Everyone seemed to give the resort a "thumbs up" - it is level and easily reached from Sheffield. There's plenty to do and you are only a short bus ride from Blackpool. We generally agreed I think that it was not long enough - three full days crammed with events - another "free day" in the middle to give us time to recharge our batteries would have been nice to explore St. Anne's itself - the marble church where Les Dawson married his wife Tracy was pointed out to us in passing but it would have been nice to be able to actually walk around the area.

Once again our thanks go out to Olwen and everyone involved in organising the holiday. Where are we off to next?

Seven days would be nice - Olwen has the Creative Travel brochures for next year. Why not talk to her, have a look, make suggestions - let's try and get a bigger complement together next time. This is the fourth holiday I have been on and have enjoyed them all - without them I wouldn't have got away at all and I think quite a few of you could say that.

Benefits

You will probably have heard in the media that there are proposals to change various government benefits. Not all the details have been finalised yet, but we know that as a result of campaigning in conjunction with RNIB, some important improvements have been made for visually impaired people. Some changes are due to start in April but some are being phased in over the next few years. We would advise you to contact us if you receive any letters about benefits from DWP, Jobcentre Plus, Pensions Service, Sheffield City Council or any other organisation. It is always better if you seek advice straight away and do not complete any forms until after you have discussed your situation with one of our Community Advice Officers.
